Gilbert B. Kaplan, Chair and Co-Founder Manufacturing Policy Initiative

Gilbert B. Kaplan recently served as Under Secretary of Commerce for International Trade in the U.S. Department of Commerce. He oversaw a workforce of 2,100 personnel within the International Trade Administration including three units: Global Markets and the Domestic and Foreign Commercial Service, Industry and Analysis, and Enforcement and Compliance.

Previously, Kaplan was a partner at King & Spalding, in the International Trade Practice Group focusing on international trade cases and trade policy issues. He filed and prosecuted the first successful countervailing duty (anti-subsidy) case ever against China in 2007. Kaplin is the founder of The Conference on the Renaissance of American Manufacturing and the co-founder of the Manufacturing Policy Initiative.

From 1983 to 1988, Kaplan served in several senior positions in the U.S. government, including Acting Assistant Secretary and Deputy Assistant Secretary for Import Administration, at the U.S. Department of Commerce. He graduated from Harvard Law School, cum laude, and Harvard College, magna cum laude.



Keith Belton American Chemistry Council

Keith Belton serves as Senior Director, Policy Analysis and Statistics for the American Chemistry Council (ACC). He has more than 25 years of experience as a policy analyst and advocate in government, industry, and academia, including positions with Indiana University's Paul H. O'Neill School of Public and Environmental Affairs, the Office of Management and Budget, the Dow Chemical Company, the American Chemistry Council, and the American Chemical Society,

where he currently serves as Senior Director, Policy Analysis and Statistics.

His particular areas of expertise include benefit-cost analysis; industrial policy, economic complexity theory, and the federal regulatory and legislative process

He previously served as Director of the Manufacturing Policy Initiative at Indiana University, where his work focused on the intersection of public policy and U.S. manufacturing competitiveness. He has served as an economist in the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs (OIRA) at the White House Office of Management and Budget and as a Director of Government Affairs at Dow. Keith holds a B.S. (chemistry) from the University of Maryland, and an M.S. (environmental science), and Ph.D. (public policy) from the George Washington University.

Eileen Bradner

Eileen Bradner retired in 2023, after spending most of her career as a lawyer and lobbyist in Washington D.C. Most recently, she was the Senior Director and Counsel for federal government affairs led the Washington office for Nucor Corporation, the largest steel company in the US.

Prior to that, she was a Partner at Wiley Rein LLP and worked in the office of Senator John Glenn. Eileen received the Lifetime

Achievement Steel Champion award from the American Iron and Steel Institute. She has been a champion for the US steel industry since her days in Senator Glenn's office in 1985, including through her engagements with Women in Steel and the Association of Women in the Metals Industries, as well as representing the industry in domestic and global fora. Terrence "Terry" Straub served as a leading advocate for the interests of the American steel industry. He retired as Senior Vice President of Public Policy and Governmental Affairs at U.S. Steel in 2009. Through his leadership positions in trade organizations and government advisory committees, he crafted domestic and international policy affecting the steel industry.

Earlier in his career he served President Jimmy Carter as special assistant for congressional affairs, managing legislative strategies for creating the Department of Education and for reorganizing the federal government. Prior to his Washington career, Straub served as special assistant to Indiana Secretary of State Larry Conrad, and later was a democratic nominee for U.S. Congress in Indiana. He was a 2011 Fellow in the Advanced Leadership Initiative at Harvard University. He holds a bachelor's degree in business from Indiana University and a master's degree from the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies.



Robert M. Sussman

Bob Sussman is the principal in Sussman and Associates, a consulting firm focusing on energy and environmental policy issues. He is Chair of the Interstate Commission for the Potomac River Basin and has taught courses o climate change and energy at Yale Law School, Yale School of Forestry and Environmental Management and Georgetown Law Center.

In 2013, Sussman completed four and a half years of service in the Obama Administration, first as Co-Chair of the Transition Team for EPA and then as Senior Policy Counsel to the EPA Administrator. In this position, he functioned as the Administrator's principal policy advisor, providing oversight and guidance on the full suite of policy issues across the Agency. He also played a key role in EPA's interface with OMB, CEQ and other White House offices and worked closely with other agencies, particularly the Department of Energy and Department of Interior.

Sussman served in the Clinton Administration as the EPA Deputy Administrator during 1993-94. In 2007, Sussman retired as a partner at the law firm of Latham & Watkins, where he headed the firm's environmental practice in DC for ten years.

Sussman is a magna cum laude 1969 graduate of Yale College and a 1973 graduate of Yale Law School.



John D. Graham (ex officio) Paul H. O'Neill School

Graham is a current Professor and former Dean of the O'Neill School. Previously, he served as Administrator, for the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs, Office of Management and Budget under George W. Bush. For President Bush, he spearheaded an interagency initiative to relieve unnecessary regulatory burdens on manufacturing in 2004-06.

He chaired the interagency task force to reform federal regulation of the auto industry in the area of fuel economy—regulations the Obama administration built upon. Graham has testified before numerous House and Senate Committees, state and federal agencies, the European Commission, and Parliament. He received a BA in Economics and Politics from Wake Forest University, a M.A in Public Affairs from Duke University, and a Ph.D., Urban and Public Affairs, from Carnegie-Mellon University.

Tom Guevara joined the IU Public Policy Institute as its fifth director in April of 2017.
